History of the Citadel

Towering above the Belfort Gap and protecting the «gates of Alsace» region, the Citadel is the result of several centuries of architectural evolution. The medieval castle built by Renaud of Burgundy was first mentioned in the 1226 Treaty of Grandvillars. The fortification was initially modified in the 17th century by the Comte de la Suze who adapted it for artillery use. **Sébastien le Prestre**, marquis de **Vauban** (1633 -1707) later turned the castle into a complete Citadel by extending its defensive walls to the city.

The 19th century was the Citadel's golden age. It survived two sieges during Napoleonic wars (one between 1813-1814 and another in 1815) and was expanded by French general and military engineer François Nicolas Benoît de Haxo (1774-1838).

Under the command of Colonel Pierre Philippe Marie Aristide **Denfert-Rochereau** (1823 - 1878), with the fierce support of Mayor Edouard Mény (1818-1891), Belfort sustained a siege of 103 days (including 73 days of bombing). The French government ordered its surrender to Prussian troops in February 1871. It was then occupied by the Prussians until 1873. The citadels of Belfort and of Bitche were the last strongholds of French resistance during the Franco-Prussian war of 1870. Rendered militarily obsolete at the beginning of the 20th century by the first aircrafts, the Citadel was regarded as a secondclass stronghold during World War I.

During World War II, the Citadel played no part in the 1940 Battle of France. Later, it was the site of guick and violent combat when the city was liberated in November 1944.

The Citadel of Belfort, now named a national heritage site, has been owned by the city of Belfort since the 1960s.


BARTHOLDI'S LION

Frédéric Auguste Bartholdi (1834-1904), an artist from Colmar, sculpted this majestic pink sandstone lion to immortalize the tenacity of Belfort's citizens during the Franco-Prussian war of 1870. It was installed beside the Citadel between 1875 and 1880. Standing at 11 meters high, 22 meters long, the statue is still France's largest sculpture to date. When Bartholdi created this statue, he was also working on another one of his other major works: New York City's Statue of Liberty.



HISTORICAL MUSEUM

The historical museum is located in the barracks built by Haxo in 1826. The museum's rich collections reveal the different phases of the history of Belfort and its region. In the museum, you can discover archaeological finds and hundreds of objects characteristic of both military life (weapons, headgear, uniforms) and civilian life. A trip through time, from prehistorical times to the 20th century!



AUGMENTED REALITY

Use your smartphone or borrow a tablet to travel through history! Where will you start? At the castle's courtyard as it was in 1579, or at the facade of Vauban's barracks? Would you like to see the panoramic terrace with its view on the city, or would you plunge through time into the ditches and the Great Gallery? Our new digital tour combines films, reconstitutions and testimonies. Immerse yourself in history by superposing the views, from one building or one facade to another.






